they don't take them seriously. I would hope that each individual on the caucus team as well as each individual that's Executive Board, Trial Committee, any position of the Local, takes their obligations seriously. I mean, that's what we expect. I think that's what the membership expects.

So I don't see where there's any room for anybody to say that they are ignorant of the rules or that the rules have not been enforced as written when issues arise. I just don't think that's the case.

Q 'Cause just as a Union member, I sat through every last Union member during the caucus and I remember it explicitly being told, "Don't put your fucking shit on Facebook. Don't talk about it on the Internet and do not" -- "do not talk to anybody outside this Union." I mean, I remember it being drilled into our heads.

A And I can tell you that that came from me because that was what was drilled into my head from our International president and the Coast Negotiating Team.

Q But from what -- just my observation, like George said, as an individual, from what George said, it's kind of not as drilled in nobody's head up there; but as a Local member, it's being drilled into my head here. So I can't see why it's not drilled into everybody's head up there.

A Listen, I can't explain or try to interpret what anybody else says or testifies to in this case in front of the membership or really in any venue for that matter. What I can tell you is that the rules are written as is and --

Q What I'm trying to get at, Bobby, was it as impressed upon you guys up there as it was us guys down here, even close?

A It was impressed upon me without any -- without putting Bob on blast, I mean, Bob chewed my ass pretty clearly because he knows that Local 13 seems to have a very rampant social media. I'm not opposed to social media. I think it's good in certain cases; but, you know, I'm not the International president --

Q Okay.

A -- and I work as directed and when I'm told what to limit and what not to limit as far as discussions to the membership, discussions to the E-Board, I try to push the envelope as much as possible because I believe that it's best that we keep the membership informed, but I can only push the envelope to a certain extent so I don't violate rules that I fully am aware of and I've been told face-to-face by the International president about.

MR. LEWIS: Okay. Any other questions?

MS. ZAKS: I have a question. Just to get a feeling

about what's going on up north for those of us that 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15

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aren't up there, for those of us that have put others in office to do what we can't do, right, so you guys are all up there and you're in the room. Now, from down here, my perspective is you're -- the caucus was divided this last time. There was half of you that were partying, you know, and just going with the wind, whichever way the wind was blowing. Because we were going to drink that night, we're going to blow with the wind because the wind wants to blow this way. And then I got the impression that the other half of the group was there for our Contract. Would you say that's a fair assumption?

THE WITNESS: I would not characterize it as a fair assumption. I would like to think that individuals were doing their due diligence.

MS. ZAKS: Well, I know you would like to, but what is the feeling up there?

THE WITNESS: The feeling was, myself, I felt like there was only a few of us who wanted to hit the mic and stand for those things that the membership of Local 13 had sent us to do.

It got to the point during the caucus, and I quess we're going off in the weeds now, but it got to the point in the caucus where there was literally arguments in the aisleways between myself and some other delegates

because of their intent to just kind of blow by what Local 13 desired and was trying to bargain for.

So were there individuals that didn't feel like the things that our Local had passed as far as resolutions that were important? I think there's always that divide. Unfortunately, now -- I think in the past you would see a divide in a caucus delegation and they would hash it out; right? They'd get down right there. If they had to caucus and take the whole Local 13 team up into a room and get down, they'd get down and discuss their differences, but there was explanation and there was discussion and dialogue about what they didn't either believe in or what they didn't feel like was important to fight for.

I can say with this last caucus delegation, partly because it was a young delegation in the sense of I think it was just JoJo, George and I, I think, were the only three come-back people. We had some good people on there, but some people just chose not to speak up.

MS. ZAKS: Okay. Thank you.

MR. LEWIS: Excuse me. Before we go any further, let's stick on point, anything that relates to what's going on with Eric.

I don't -- as chairman, I don't want to hear anything about what they did as a caucus. I just want to

hear if there's got anything to do with the wind blowing 1 Eric's way. That's all I want to hear. MR. DUARTE: I second. 3 MR. TRIMMER: I mean, so this can be short answers. They don't have to be long ones. 5 I know it's been a long time since I've taken my 6 oath, but you swear people in all the time. We take an 7 oath not to divulge information from the meetings or 8 Union business. Do they have a similar type of swearing 9 in or oath that people take at caucus? 10 THE WITNESS: Not to that extent, no. 11 MR. LEWIS: All right. 12 13 MR. TRIMMER: Just --THE WITNESS: Just your oath at the Local and the 14 rules that are adopted by the caucus on the first day. 15 16 FURTHER EXAMINATION 17 18 BY MR. SEIXAS: Q Okay. At this point I'm going to ask a question 19 about the flyer, Bulletin 29-14, in which you put the 20 Facebook message on there and also keeping things for 21 22 the --MR. TOLEDO: I was not asked to ask a question about 23 the subject that you were talking about. 24 MR. SEIXAS: Hold your thought on it and I'll come 25

back to both you and Eric on this witness like I did before.

BY MR. SEIXAS:

Q So could you describe what was going on and why you guys put out a social media memo and how often you discussed it at the Local level at the Union meetings?

A So we've been discussing the utilization of social media as far as our workplace and our industry for a long time. It's nothing new. We've been talking about this both at the membership meetings and at the Executive Boards. So this wasn't specifically directed towards negotiations, although it came out during negotiations, but I think it's a -- not a side effect, but it's a -- it kind of resulted out of this debate that we've had internally as a Union as to what's good and what's not good. When you see people injured or, God forbid, killed on the job and pictures are up before the B.A.s have a chance to notify family, that's a perfect example where social media is a detriment to us.

During negotiations, there were individuals that took pictures or posted video that showed at a point in time during their workday or work night that there didn't seem to be anything for them to do, not that we have jobs where we don't do anything because obviously we're always working. When we're getting paid, we're always working.

But it plays to the media and the Employers' advantage when individuals put things on social media where it says, "Look, I'm not working" or "I'm just sitting here and there's no cargo in the yard and the Employer keeps paying me. Keep doing it." It's things like that that this was borne out of.

But most definitely we put it out during this period of time because of the process of negotiations and based on discussions we had had both with the officers at the International, the Coast Committee, and the officers here locally about how careful we needed to be as a Local and, too, how we needed to make sure that our membership understood that the things that they say and do especially on social media can have a direct impact on the Coastwide negotiations, can have a direct impact on Local negotiations, and we've seen it here just in the last two weeks.

We've seen how postings on social media or websites during the course of negotiations for agreements can hamper the Union's ability to even reach those agreements.

When we're handed flyers and screen shots of websites by PMA officials across the table, it's upsetting. It's upsetting to me as the president of this Local, just as I think it was upsetting to Bob at the

International to have the Employer push across a screen shot of a website or a flyer.

And the follow-up is did you get the feeling from Big Bob or did you get the feeling that Eric's flyer with the "All in we can win" was detrimental to negotiations?

I didn't get the feeling. I listened to what our International president said on the microphone and he said very clearly that the flyer cost us money. It cost us an ability to bargain a higher wage package than what was ultimately agreed to.

So I wouldn't assume, because I didn't sit at the big table but for periodic times, certain periods of time, but Big Bob was as clear as a person could be that this flyer was a detriment to negotiations.

MR. SEIXAS: Okay. Thank you.

Was there anybody else who had a question? Okay. What I'm going to do is I'm going to recognize David Toledo. I'll recognize the person bringing the charges first, and then I'll recognize Eric, if you wanted to --

MR. LEWIS: Just before you start, Eric, David, one other question.

1 FURTHER EXAMINATION 2 BY MR. LEWIS: 3 At any time, is any caucus delegate given, let's say, the authority to exercise his own judgment without 4 5 asking anybody first? 6 Is a caucus delegate --7 As a caucus delegate, could you in any way construe that anything in these rules can be adhered to 8 or passed away because of your own personal judgment of 9 10 what you thought should be put out there on social media? 11 Absolutely not. You take an oath as a caucus delegate, as a sitting delegate at the caucus. You 12 acknowledge that the rules that are contained and adopted 13 by the caucus are standing rules and should be --14 15 0 Adhered to. -- adhered to. 16 A 17 MR. LEWIS: That's all. 18 MR. TRIMMER: One quick question. Are caucus 19 delegates paid? Yes, they are. THE WITNESS: 21 MR. TRIMMER: How? 22 THE WITNESS: They are paid in accordance with the 23 Constitution of Local 13 and they are paid per diem. 24 Lodging's in accordance with the directions that are sent

to us from the Coast Committee.

MR. LEWIS: All right, Dave. Go ahead. The Chair 1 recognizes Dave. 2 MR. TOLEDO: Thank you. 3 4 EXAMINATION 5 BY MR. TOLEDO: 6 That paper that -- that is being shown, is it 7 something that's signed by the caucus delegates? 8 I'm not sure which --9 MR. LEWIS: Which one are you talking about? 10 MR. TOLEDO: The one that John Seixas was showing 11 12 everyone else. MR. LEWIS: The caucus rules? 13 MR. TOLEDO: I believe so, yes. I don't have a copy 14 of it. 15 THE WITNESS: I think the easier answer is that when 16 you appear at a caucus, you have a packet that they give 17 you. There's a table, kind of like a sign-in table; and 18 as you receive your packet, they sign in that you've 19 received the packet. So by your acceptance of the caucus 20 packet, it is my understanding that you understand what's 21 contained within the packet. They go through the packet, 22 line item -- or page by page the first day. Usually the 23

chairman will go through and say on page one is your --

if you get health problems, you go to this doctor.

1 Page two is, you know, this document. Page three is 2 this. 3 So they don't sign this actual document, but when you appear as a caucus delegate, you don't just get 4 5 your packet. You have to go to the table and receive 6 your packet. 7 MR. LEWIS: So by accepting the pay and the position, 8 you automatically accept the rules? 9 THE WITNESS: I don't see how -- I don't think it's 10 written anywhere where it says when you accept this 11 package and when you go on payroll, you must adhere to 12 the rules contained herein. 13 MR. LEWIS: It's a given though. THE WITNESS: Nobody tells me in the morning I have 14 15 to breathe in and out. I just know that I have to do it. MR. LEWIS: Go ahead, Ernie. 16 17 MR. DUARTE: In your personal opinion, when you run 18 for a job as a caucus delegate, you know the rules when 19 you're running for it. You know what it means to 20 represent the membership and you know what's right and what's wrong. In your personal opinion, do you think that's --23 THE WITNESS: Well, I won't give you my personal 24 opinion because my personal opinion is my personal

opinion and I've been the subject of attacks for the last

five years on Mr. Aldape's website.

What I will tell you is that Mr. Aldape did take the microphone at the caucus and apologize to the body. I'm not sure I've ever heard Eric actually apologize for anything, so hearing him apologize, I have to take it for what it's worth, that he was apologizing for the conduct that he talked about.

So my personal opinion I don't think is relevant here, but I will tell you that Eric did take the microphone at the caucus and apologize to the caucus delegates in their entirety for his conduct.

MR. DUARTE: Thank you.

MR. LEWIS: Any other questions?

MR. MOLINA: Did you say receiving compensation for services provided as a caucus member and also being sworn in as a caucus member does create a fiduciary responsibility to the Union to protect the Union?

THE WITNESS: I think it creates even more than a fiduciary responsibility. I think it creates a responsibility to uphold the standards of this Local, to uphold what the membership has tasked you to do with.

So whether it is paid or unpaid, whether it is in San Francisco or Hueneme or Los Angeles or at PMA, any time any individual member of this Local is representing somebody other than themselves, they have a

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responsibility to the Local as a whole. They have a
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     responsibility to do what is asked of them, to abide by
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     the rules, and there was no -- there was no lack of
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     direction by myself that was given to caucus delegates
 5
     about their conduct. We didn't have to go into it
 6
     specifically so as not to try to have anyone feel that it
 7
     was directed specifically at them. It was a generalized
 8
     statement to the caucus delegation of, you know, You guys
 9
     know the rules. You know what you need to be doing.
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     Don't be on Facebook while we're in caucus. Don't be,
11
     you know, putting -- checking in at Pete's Coffee House
     at 11:30 a.m. when we're at caucus, not because we don't
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13
     care that you went to get coffee, but you're here to do a
14
     job. You're not here to post on social media. You're
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     not here to do that. So --
          MS. ZAKS: So it was said?
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          THE WITNESS: It was absolutely said.
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          MS. ZAKS: Thank you.
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                      Any other questions?
          MR. LEWIS:
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          MR. SEIXAS: David had a question.
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          MR. LEWIS: You got another question, Dave?
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         MR. TOLEDO: No, that was it.
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         MR. SEIXAS: And then ask Brother Aldape if he has
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     questions.
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         MR. LEWIS: Eric?
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          MR. ALDAPE: No, I have no questions.
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          MR. LEWIS: Thank you.
              All right. Thanks, bro.
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          THE WITNESS: Thanks, guys.

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BOBBY ELLIOT,

called as a Witness, was examined and testified as follows:

BY MR. SEIXAS:

Q Bobby, I was wondering if for the room you could describe your experience at the Home Depot Center with what you witnessed with Brother Aldape and the admission to what he did up in San Francisco.

EXAMINATION

A I had hit the mic at Home Depot Center. After I finished, I had sat down 'cause I had wanted to add another point. Somebody else had went up to the mic.

At that point, I didn't -- somebody else had got to the mic because I had got back in line -- when I was waiting in line.

As I was sitting there, it got brought up about everything that -- the releasing of the information and things like that I guess with Eric Aldape. As I was sitting there at the stage, Eric went to the mic, tried to speak on the mic, and at that point that's when -- I believe it was Bobby Olvera informed him that he was censured and was not allowed to speak and had the sergeant --

(Interruption in the proceedings)

BY MR. SEIXAS: Q Go ah A And c

Q Go ahead. Continue.

A And called the sergeant-at-arms because he would not stop speaking as he was directed. Sergeant-at-arms had to come get him.

MS. ZAKS: Come get who?

THE WITNESS: Come get Eric Aldape off the mic. He wouldn't stop speaking. He went back to try to grab the mic and the sergeant-at-arms grabbed the mic and physically like literally had it.

Eric Aldape was three feet or so in front of the mic towards the stage. He put his arms out and said, "Yeah, I did it. What the fuck are you going to do about it?" to all the caucus members and all our elected officials sitting on stage.

That's what I heard. I didn't know at the time what was going on and what had happened in San Francisco and, you know, that's all I knew.

MR. SEIXAS: Okay. Thank you.

THE WITNESS: Can I leave? I've gotta --

MR. BLACK: Well, we've got to let Mr. Aldape get --

THE WITNESS: I've got to get my daughter from

school.

MR. SEIXAS: I understand.

Does anybody have any questions for Brother

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Bobby?
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          MR. LEWIS: Anybody have any other questions?

Let's call this Trial 5 Committee meeting back to order and now we recognize 6 Brother Eric Aldape. 7 MR. SEIXAS: Hold on a second. 8 MR. LEWIS: Hold on. MR. SEIXAS: I'm sorry. I'm having a -- my brain --10 MR. LEWIS: Is there a reason why we can't turn the 11 12 floor over to Eric? MR. SEIXAS: Yeah. 13 Eric -- yeah, that's not a problem. I just 14 wanted to make sure I was proceeding in the right order. 15 I didn't know if it was --16 MR. LEWIS: That's where we were at when he called 17 the caucus. 18 MR. SEIXAS: Okay. All right. 19 MR. LEWIS: The Chair recognizes -- The Chair 21 recognizes Ernie. 22 MR. DUARTE: Is he going to enter a plea? He never entered a plea. 23 MR. LEWIS: Point of order real quick, Eric. You 2.4 never entered a plea verbally to the charges. Is it --25

MR. ALDAPE: Is it my turn to put on my case? 1 MR. LEWIS: As soon as you enter a plea. 2 MR. ALDAPE: Is it my turn to put on my case? 3 MR. LEWIS: You know what, Eric? Go ahead. 4 MR. ALDAPE: Thank you. 5 All right. First of all, I'm going to challenge 6 this Committee. The rules are clear. There's supposed 7 to be 12 guys on this committee. There's 11 here. 8 Correct? All the rules say that. It's 12 plus three 9 10 alternates. And then I'm going to challenge Mr. Seixas for 11 bias. Brother Seixas is Bonnie Olvera's boy toy and I 12 can make a claim to it. He was Bobby's witness in a 13 grievance against me. He came in there and lied. The 14 Grievance Committee found him to be a liar and ruled in 15 my favor because Mr. Olvera filed a complaint against me, 16 says I was tearing down his flyers in the hall, used 17 Seixas over there for his witness. 18 Mr. Seixas is a member of the Grievance 19 Committee which I sit on, he and Brother Toledo. 20 made three motions -- two motions in a row to remove me 21 from the Grievance Committee, because if I'm absent three 22 times in a row, then I've gotta get removed. 23

I had to write Brother Bob, Bobby, the president, and ask him for an interpretation. I never

got my interpretation. But guess what? When it came down for the third grievance for them to make their motion, they didn't make it. I stayed.

That brother right there (indicating), I'm removing him for bias. He needs to get up and leave.

That brother right there (indicating), no disrespect --

MR. TRIMMER: Me?

MR. ALDAPE: That brother right there (indicating), no disrespect, the rules are clear. You can't be a member of a Grievance Committee or any other committee and volunteer for a Trial Committee. I know we've done it before in the past. I'll put on a witness that'll testify to the fact that we don't let brothers that are on other committees serve on Trial Committees.

So here's where we're at right now. We're at a committee that doesn't have enough people to proceed.

Seixas, you might as well get up and leave because you are out. You get challenged for bias.

You're out and you know it. You were a witness for this man who's walking out the door right now, because his whole thing is thrown apart right now and he knows it.

(Whereupon Mr. Olvera exited the proceedings)
MR. ALDAPE: So I'm moving that we stop these

proceedings until you guys get a real committee in here

and follow your own rules. It says 12 guys with three 1 alternates. You've got 11 guys sitting right here and I 2 just challenged two. 3 MR. TRIMMER: Are you challenging me for bias? 4 MR. ALDAPE: Yes. 5 MR. TRIMMER: Bias? 6 MR. ALDAPE: No, not bias, only for what the rules 7 say, Brother. Like I said, no disrespect to you. The 8 rules are clear. MR. TRIMMER: Are you challenging me for bias? You 10 11 said no? MR. ALDAPE: I'm challenging you for what the rules 12 say. The rules say you can't --13 MR. TRIMMER: I'm not on the Grievance Committee. 14 MR. LEWIS: Trimmer, hold on. 15 First and foremost, okay, you're challenging him 16 17 (indicating) for bias. 18 MR. ALDAPE: Correct. MR. LEWIS: We'll go down the line. I don't know of 19 any rule that says he can't sit as attorney-of-facts. If 21 you could show it to me, if you can show it to me, I'm 22 not biased at all. MR. ALDAPE: I just challenged him for bias. Either 23 you can remove him, he's going to remove himself -- I 24 already made the case he's biased. It's true he was a 25

witness for Bobby to try to bring a grievance against me 1 and they both lost. And you think I want to sit here? 2 How am I getting a fair shot? 3 You guys might want to look at your rules. It 4 says -- in your rules, it says, if a person is being 5 found biased and is not removed and we go on with the 6 7 hearing, then you've got a no-good hearing. MR. BLACK: You did say define bias, which means that 8 you've got to prove with evidence --MR. ALDAPE: I did. 10 MR. BLACK: You're just claiming, but you've got to 11 prove it, too. You have to prove it. 12 13 MR. DUARTE: I have a question. MR. SEIXAS: No. No. Hold on. Let the Chair. 14 MR. LEWIS: The Chair recognizes Brother Ernie. I'm 15 going to be up -- you know what? Let's go off record. 16 17 Let's shut down for a minute. I want to read this. MR. DUARTE: I second to go off record. 18 MR. LEWIS: Executive Session. We're going to take a 19 break for five minutes. Five minutes. 20 21 (Executive Session) MR. LEWIS: On record. We sent the sergeant-at-arms 22 looking. It's past his five minutes. 23 MR. DUARTE: Brother JoJo, in your personal opinion 24 and the experience you have, do we have to wait for a 25

1 member as long as we wants to show up or can we proceed? 2 MR. CORTEZ: That's a good question. I mean, he has 3 a right. I don't know who he's talking to. I don't know 4 who he's talking to. He could also be talking to his 5 attorney. MR. DUARTE: He didn't call for a caucus. We needed 6 7 five minutes. But if he needs more time, he could come 8 and ask for more time; right? 9 MR. LEWIS: At this time, he's been given 55 minutes 10 of caucus time, at this point. 11 MR. DUARTE: More. No. An hour and --12 MR. LEWIS: We gave him 35 the first time, 15 the 13 second time, and it's been 5 this time, although he took 14 15 minutes last time. 15 MR. DUARTE: Yeah. 16 MR. SEIXAS: We can be off record. Motion to be off record so she doesn't have to record this. Here we go. 17 18 Motion to go back on. All in favor, say "aye"? 19 us consent. 20 (Whereupon Mr. Aldape reentered the proceedings) 21 MR. LEWIS: All right. Trial Committee comes back 22 into session. 23 Brother Eric, just so you know, from the gate, 24 we used the guidelines. We voted from the gate that we 25 weren't going to use 12 members. We were only going to

use six. 1 MR. ALDAPE: As long as you've got it on the record; 2 3 right? MR. LEWIS: Yeah. 4 MR. ALDAPE: That works for me. Do whatever you 5 want. 7 MR. LEWIS: Okay. You can appeal this any time you 8 feel like it, my brother. As far as your first point goes about the 12, that's been -- we've just addressed that. I'm letting 10 you know we decided to go with six with an alternate of 11 12 what? MS. ZAKS: Three. 13 MR. LEWIS: Three. All right. 14 Second point, just because this man (indicating) 15 parked in your parking space 12 years ago and denied you 16 a parking spot to your house doesn't mean that you've 17 got -- that he's biased against you. 18 Second of all, Brother Trimmer is on the 19 Executive Board and not on the Grievance Committee like 21 you said. So I don't see any conflict of interest with 22 either one of these brothers. 23 Brother Trimmer? 24 The Chair recognizes Brother Trimmer.

MR. TRIMMER: I'd like to know -- you said it's our 1 rules that I can't serve on two committees. Do you have proof? I didn't see it anywhere in here. 3 MR. LEWIS: If you can highlight it and pass it down 4 5 to us, I'll give you a spare copy. MR. TRIMMER: And I'll be happy to recuse myself. MR. LEWIS: So I'll review it. MR. SEIXAS: He's chosen not to speak. MR. LEWIS: At this point right now, every time you choose not to respond, I'm going to have it put on 10 11 record. Okay? You know what? Just for everybody in here, I'm 12 tired of this child bullshit. I really am. There's 13 procedures to this shit. We're trying to stick to 14 procedures and you've taken more time than you did with 15 your second caucus. Now you've taken two more minutes 16 past your five minutes so I could review what you said. 17 I'm trying to be fair. I really am. 18 MR. ALDAPE: What do you want me to answer for when 19 you already said he's not going and he's not going? I've 20 21 got nothing to say, bro. MR. LEWIS: You can appeal it later, but now it's 22 23 your turn to put --MR. ALDAPE: What do you want me to say? 24 MR. LEWIS: Okay. Now go beyond that, because that's 25

1 been addressed. MR. TRIMMER: Wait a minute. You never said I'm not 3 going to go. I asked you to prove that it's in our constitution that I can't serve on two and I'd be happy 4 5 to recuse myself and you chose not to answer. MS. ZAKS: Very nice. 6 7 MR. LEWIS: The Chair recognizes Brother Arthur. MR. LOWE: I'll ask. I don't know if I'll ask a 8 9 little bit nicer or know how I can ask you. Everybody's 10 trying to take this as serious as possible. Hopefully you can take it as serious as we are. Do you have 11 12 anything that you can show us to where we can excuse 13 these gentlemen, anything? MR. ALDAPE: I think I was clear the first time, 14 15 brother. 16 MR. LOWE: Okay. He feels that's an answer. MR. ALDAPE: The Chair made a statement. He said 17 18 they're not going. 19 MR. LEWIS: I did not say they're not going. We're 20 asking you to show -- you showed me the trial procedure thing. Me and Brother Arthur stepped out. We read it independently. We don't see anything --2.3 MR. ALDAPE: No, brother. I showed you the trial 24 procedure and you guys already came back and said, No, we

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changed that to six.

1 MR. LEWIS: We don't see anything. 2 MR. ALDAPE: All right. Fine then. Let's go on. MR. LEWIS: All right. Let's go on. 3 MR. LOWE: Could you bring that up so we can read it, 4 5 sir? MR. ALDAPE: It's the one you guys sent me in the 6 7 mail, the same one you guys sent me. 8 MR. LOWE: Could you bring that up so I can read it? MR. LEWIS: We don't see it. 9 10 MR. LOWE: Hold on for a second. 11 Bring it up so I can read it, please. 12 MR. ALDAPE: What do you want to read, bro? It's the 13 same trial procedure you sent me. 14 MR. LOWE: I want to read what you said to where we 15 have to excuse these gentlemen. 16 MR. ALDAPE: I can challenge any member for bias on 17 this committee. 18 MR. LOWE: I want to read what you say you have. 19 Thank you. Where's it at? 20 MR. ALDAPE: Right there (indicating), the second 21 paragraph. You can challenge any member for bias. MR. TRIMMER: But you didn't challenge me for bias. MR. ALDAPE: I didn't challenge you for bias. I told 23 24 you that already, Trimmer. Jesus. MR. LOWE: For the record, he's looking at the second

paragraph on trial procedures. 1 MR. LEWIS: It just says he has the right to question 3 any witness before the Trial Committee. He questioned them. 5 I don't see -- we can put it to the table. I can't see any bias because one brother happens to be on 6 another committee and another brother happened to be part 7 of another trial somewhere. MR. ALDAPE: Brother, wait a minute. 10 MR. LEWIS: Excuse me. Just a minute, Eric. Let me 11 finish, please. All right? I don't see that he had another case -- I don't 12 13 see how that's going to bias. He's attorney-of-facts. 14 All he can do is put before us what the charges were and 15 whether he found them -- you know, there's ten other intelligent fuckers in here that didn't see any bias in 16 17 what he put before us. Go ahead, Brother Ernie. 18 MR. DUARTE: Could we read him our motion that we 19 20 made? Because this motion says: "A motion should be made for a number 21 of people to serve on a trial committee. 12 23 people with three alternates is the recommendation." 24 It's a recommendation, but we made it -- we --

1	MR. LEWIS: Well, I've explained that to him.
2	MR. DUARTE: No, but we have our
3	MS. ZAKS: Minutes.
4	MR. DUARTE: Yeah, our minutes.
5	MS. ZAKS: Yes, we do.
6	MR. DUARTE: And we can read them to him so he knows
7	we're not being
8	MR. LEWIS: Sorry. No. Paula's out sick and she has
9	the minutes. I want that explained to him.
10	So Eric, put on the rest of your case, please.
11	MR. ALDAPE: Thanks. Thanks, guys.
12	MR. TRIMMER: You're being impatient with us?
13	MR. LEWIS: Where's JoJo?
14	MR. DUARTE: He had to go. He had to go somewhere.
15	MR. ALDAPE: There's copies for the court reporter.
16	You can do with them what you want. This is the
17	first letter they sent me. It's numbered like I always
18	give them to you. And they can get their own copies. I
19	didn't come here for them.
20	MR. OLVERA: Brother Chair, point of order.
21	MR. LEWIS: Brother, the Chair recognizes Brother
22	Olvera.
23	MR. OLVERA: Just as an outside observation,
24	documents that are presented are submitted to the
25	Trial Committee, not the court reporter. The court

reporter has no official standing here in these 7 proceedings. 2 MR. LEWIS: Ten-four. Do you mind if I grab these, Eric? All right. You don't have to get up. I don't have a problem with them. MR. ALDAPE: Make yourself some copies. Those are 6 the copies for the court reporter. MR. LEWIS: And you are submitting these for what 9 reason? MR. ALDAPE: Those are the letters that you sent to 10 me and I sent to you. 11 MR. LEWIS: Okay. 12 MR. ALDAPE: Those are all the letters that I sent to 13 14 you. MR. LEWIS: And you're submitting them for what 15 reason? 16 MR. ALDAPE: This is part of my case. 17 MR. LEWIS: Okay. Continue on. 18 19 MR. ALDAPE: Thank you. Before I start my defense, I demand a 20 clarification from the president on the question of 21 double jeopardy as defined by our Constitution and how it 22 applies to this charge related to a letter that was read 23 by Big Bob at the caucus for which I accepted censure at 24 the caucus.

Depending on the president's answer in writing or transcribed by a court reporter, I'm going to need the following documents before I proceed: a copy of the transcripts from the afternoon session of the caucus where my letter was discussed and my censure was made a part of the record. There you will find that Bob didn't say that he was getting \$7, because I was there, too; a copy of the list of members who signed up for the Trial Committee at the first Union meeting where it was announced; a copy of the list of members who signed up for the Trial Committee at the third Union meeting where it was announced.

The second matter that I request for clarification: whether or not this is a valid Trial Committee, because according to the Constitution, the charge shall be read at a membership meeting and a Trial Committee picked at that membership meeting. In this case, the charge was never read. The secretary-treasurer just announced that there was a trial committee against me and members were asked to sign up, but not enough people signed up to go ahead with the trial. At the next Union meeting, there was not a quorum, so members were asked not to sign up. But that didn't stop Bobby from talking shit about me, including accusing me of screwing up the Child of Deceased rule because I'm happy --

helping Rapid Fire's daughter.

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At the third Union meeting, members were asked again to sign up for the Trial Committee with the charge being read as required by the Constitution -- without the charge being read as required by the Constitution. I will need a written clarification from the president as to whether this is a valid Trial Committee charge, as the charge was never read to the membership as required by the Constitution and the committee was not picked in accordance with the Constitution.

The third matter that needs clarification from the president is whether or not I have the right to be provided the transcripts from the caucus meeting where he announced that I had accepted censure and Big Bob explained how he used my letter to get another \$1 per hour.

Before going forward, I will need these clarifications that I've requested in writing or transcribed by the court reporter because only the president can interpret the Constitution, not this committee.

MR. LEWIS: Was that it?

As far as the transcripts are concerned -- we'll go down the list one by one.

MR. TOLEDO: I have a point of order.

MR. LEWIS: Go ahead. 1 MR. TOLEDO: I take it that that's his defense. Is 2 it my turn now? 3 MR. SEIXAS: Just a second. We have rights to ask 4 questions, and I'm going to go ahead and ask the first 5 question to your defense. 6 Could you go to the article of our Constitution 7 that speaks of no double jeopardy? 8 MR. ALDAPE: Are you talking to me? 9 MR. SEIXAS: Yes. 10 MR. LEWIS: Yes, sir. 11 MR. SEIXAS: I'm allowed to ask you questions. I'm 12 asking you a question. 13 MR. ALDAPE: You're only allowed to ask me questions 14 if I'm a witness. I'm not a witness, but I'll give you 15 the page number and I'll give you the letter. I'll even 16 bring it up to you. It's on page 12, letter B of the 17 Constitution. Right after that word (indicating). 18 MR. SEIXAS: Yeah. 19 MR. ALDAPE: I'll submit page 12 into the record, 21 please. MR. SEIXAS: Before you submit it, please note that 22 it's Section 9 (sic), which is dealing with Grievance 23 Committee. This is a trial. 24 MR. ALDAPE: I submit it for the record as part of my 25
