1 case, brother. MR. LEWIS: Okay. The Chair recognizes 3 Brother Trimmer. MR. TRIMMER: It says here in the letter to you that 4 the transcript will be made to you and entitle you to 6 purchase a copy. Did you do that? That's --MR. ALDAPE: No, I don't have a problem with calling the -- that's this transcript. 8 9 MR. TRIMMER: So do you have a copy of that? I mean, is it one of your demands? Because I'm hearing a lot of 10 11 things, but I'm not seeing any evidence. Did you make an 12 attempt to purchase a copy of the transcripts that you 13 requested? You received this letter in a timely manner; 14 correct? 15 MR. ALDAPE: I don't think you know what you're 16 talking about here, bro. 17 MR. TRIMMER: It says right here: 18 "This letter responds to your letter 19 dated December 29, 2015. A transcript of 20 the hearing will be made and you will be 21 entitled to purchase a copy." 22 What does that mean to you? Did you 23 purchase a copy of the transcript that you requested? MR. ALDAPE: Brother, let me help you out. That 24 letter came to me when they told me that I had asked for 25

a court reporter and that's the letter that they sent 1 2 back, that your committee sent back to me, telling me 3 that they granted me a court reporter and if I wanted a 4 copy of it that I could go ahead and purchase it. 5 MR. TRIMMER: Okay. 6 MR. ALDAPE: That's what that letter says. MR. TRIMMER: Just come back to me. 7 MR. LEWIS: Okay. Are you done, Brother Seixas? 9 MR. SEIXAS: Yes, I'm done. MR. LEWIS: As to -- I didn't -- I'm sorry, Eric. I 10 11 didn't write down everything you said. The first point 12 was what? MR. ALDAPE: There's a copy. I put it in the record. 13 14 The president sitting right over here to my left 15 needs to give an interpretation of the Constitution, like 16 I asked for, but you guys don't want to do that, because 17 he's the only one that can interpret the Constitution. The committee can't. The president, sitting right here, 18 19 knows that the committee can't interpret the 20 Constitution. If you guys don't know it, I'm sorry, but 21 at least now you guys do know it. 22 MR. LEWIS: Brother Bob, can you interpret the 23 Constitution? 24 MR. OLVERA: Yes, I can. It's my charged duties under the Constitution. 25

MR. ALDAPE: I've asked for an interpretation. 1 2 MR. LEWIS: All right. Excuse me. I'm going to get 3 you one right now. 4 Brother Olvera, can we get an interpretation of 5 the Constitution? 6 MR. OLVERA: Brother Chair, am I here as a witness or 7 are you asking me as the presiding officer of the Local? MR. LEWIS: I'm asking you as our presiding 9 president. 10 MR. OLVERA: I will answer any questions that the 11 Committee feels necessary to adjudicate this complaint. 12 MR. LEWIS: Okay. 13 MR. LOWE: Thank you. 14 MR. LEWIS: So what do we do? MR. SEIXAS: You ask the question. 15 16 MR. LEWIS: Sir, can I get an interpretation of the Constitution as it pertains to Brother Aldape's 17 18 complaint? 19 MR. TRIMMER: Double jeopardy. 20 MR. LEWIS: Double jeopardy. I'm sorry. 21 MR. OLVERA: Brother Aldape has pointed out an item that's notated as Item B on page 12. It is part of --22 23 what Mr. Aldape has failed to enlighten the Committee on 24 is that it's part of a section that is titled Grievance 25 Committee. We don't cherry-pick sections out of the

1 Constitution and apply them where we think they fit or 2 where we think that we can utilize them. We read and 3 interpret the Constitution as written.

As written, that section of the Constitution that specifies double jeopardy is applied and is specific to the Grievance Committee. It appears nowhere else. There is a section that is specific to charges against members. Nowhere within that section of the Constitution does there exist anything that talks about double jeopardy. So my interpretation of the Constitution as far as the application of the language contained under the Grievance Committee, as far as the Trial Committee, it does not apply. It's apples and oranges.

MR. LEWIS: Thank you.

So for your interpretation further, Brother Aldape, you can't apply Local 63 rules to Local 13. So that does not count. So we scratched that one off the list.

MR. ALDAPE: He needs to interpret page 34, Article XIII, Section 1, Letter A:

"Charges against a member must be filed in writing with the president or secretary-treasurer who shall read the same at the next regular membership meeting of the Local and there a trial committee shall

be elected."

I need an interpretation on that, brother.

MR. LEWIS: Can I get an interpretation, Brother Olvera, as it pertains to Trial Committee sign-ups.

MR. OLVERA: The Constitution is clear as far as the A through F under Article XIII. The Trial Committee, as has been done in the past and currently is done, adopts the rules that they will perform their duties by. There is no ability for our Union to mandate people to sign up for Trial Committee. I think any inference that the Local takes a position, whether it is mandating people to please come up and sign or encouraging people not to sign, is absolutely a lie and should be considered as such on the record, but the charges and penalties section of Article XIII are very clear.

MR. LEWIS: All right. That's one more scratched off. Go ahead. I'm sorry, Bobby. All right. That's it?

MR. ALDAPE: This is a statement I read.

MR. LEWIS: That section is scratched off. And your third?

MR. BLACK: He's giving it to the court reporter.

MR. LEWIS: Could you stop handing stuff to our court reporter?

MR. ALDAPE: That's what I read into the record.

MR. LEWIS: All right. What was the third complaint 1 2 you had about the Trial Committee? MR. ALDAPE: The transcripts --3 MR. LEWIS: The transcripts. 4 MR. ALDAPE: -- from the caucus. 6 MR. LEWIS: I don't know if we're required to provide 7 you that. MR. ALDAPE: You're not required to provide me that, 8 9 but if I write the caucus, they can provide it to me. 10 MR. LEWIS: Okay. Then you can write the caucus and 11 appeal this, but right now I'm just -- go ahead, Brother 12 Bobby. 13 MR. OLVERA: Brother Chair, the Local has not 14 received to date our own copies of the transcripts from 15 that caucus. We don't control those transcripts. We 16 don't take care of them in-house. The brother has the 17 right to request, as he's had the right since the charge 18 was filed, to request these documents from the caucus. 19 MR. LEWIS: The Chair recognizes Brother Ernie. MR. DUARTE: Question to Bobby as our president. 21 Has Brother Aldape requested -- has Brother Aldape requested anything from the Coast, minutes or 23 anything? 24 MR. LEWIS: Well, Bobby wouldn't know that. MR. OLVERA: Brother Aldape requests a lot of things.

1	MR. DUARTE: But has he requested those exact
2	minutes?
3	MR. OLVERA: To me, I have not seen anything from my
4	recollection that he's requested those documents. I had
5	heard that he requested transcripts. I myself have, you
6	know, wanted the transcripts from the caucus so I can
7	read them, but they're not available to us.
8	MR. DUARTE: What about to Eric, have you
9	requested them and what date did you request them,
10	please?
11	MR. LEWIS: When was the date that you requested the
12	documents?
13	MR. ALDAPE: Oh, I turned it in here. You can get it
14	from Paula.
15	MR. DUARTE: You don't know when?
16	MR. ALDAPE: The transcript of the caucus.
17	MR. DUARTE: But you can't tell us what date?
18	MR. ALDAPE: No.
19	MR. LEWIS: No, he's not going to be able to.
20	MS. ZAKS: I would really like to know what
21	Mr. Lawrence wanted to talk about.
22	MR. SEIXAS: We'll get to him.
23	MR. LEWIS: We'll get to him in just a second.
24	Okay. As far as the three things that you
25	brought up, Brother Eric, you've gotten your

interpretation of both the Trial Committee, our 1 membership; you've gotten your interpretation from the 2 president on your double jeopardy, which you had an 3 opportunity at the hearing to address but you chose to be 4 silent; and the third is your transcripts. I can't get 5 them. Bobby can't get them as a president of our Local, 6 not just yet, and so that's on you. That's your defense. You've had a month and a half to prepare your defense 9 that I know of. 10 MR. ALDAPE: Well, if you can't get them, the Local 11 can't get them, it seems like we're going to have to wait until we get them. 12 13 MR. LEWIS: I don't see how it's pertinent towards 14 your defense. I mean --15 MR. ALDAPE: What do you mean? 16 MR. LEWIS: Personally --17 MR. ALDAPE: If you want to keep on going, then just 18 keep on going. 19 Then we're going to keep on going. MR. LEWIS: MR. SEIXAS: At this point, Eric, is there anything else that you want to say in your defense? 21 22 MR. BLACK: We need to ask him to enter a plea still. 23 MR. SEIXAS: No. He's putting on his defense and I don't want to cut him short. 24 25 MR. LEWIS: That was the first part. Is there any

1 other part to your defense? MR. ALDAPE: No, brother. This whole thing is a big 2 3 joke because everything I've asked for, you won't give it to me. You know I need the transcript. You won't give 4 5 them to me. MR. LEWIS: I can't give you anything I don't have. 6 7 MR. ALDAPE: You guys have got a set of rules. They 8 say 12 people. "Oh, well, no. We're going to use six." MR. LEWIS: No. They're suggested rules. 9 10 MR. ALDAPE: They're suggested. They're not rules, 11 but they're just suggested. 12 MR. SEIXAS: I suggest you wipe your ass when you're 13 done shitting, but you don't have to. 14 MR. ALDAPE: I don't. I don't. MR. LEWIS: What's next? 15 16 MR. SEIXAS: Eric, I'm trying to make sure that you 17 get as fair a trial as you can get. MR. ALDAPE: Well, then maybe you ought to stop 18 19 talking to your friends because your friends are telling me that you guys have already had this thing done. 21 MR. LEWIS: No. No. 22 MR. ALDAPE: I can bring that witness in, too, if 23 that's what you want. I'll bring the guy that you've 24 been talking to, because I already know what you're going 25 to go before you even got here, Seixas.

1	MR. LEWIS: That's him, not us.
2	MR. ALDAPE: Yes, him.
3	MR. LEWIS: You and I have never had a problem. That
4	was the reason I agreed to chair this, because you and I
5	have never had a problem.
6	MR. ALDAPE: Bet you didn't know that, h'm? You
7	didn't know he was my friend, h'm?
8	MR. SEIXAS: I have no idea what you're talking
9	about.
10	MR. LEWIS: Stop. Stop. Stop. I'm not
11	getting into rumor shit anymore.
12	MR. DUARTE: Okay. What friend is this?
13	MR. LEWIS: I don't care. I don't care.
14	MR. ALDAPE: Tell them, Seixas. Tell them who you've
15	been talking to.
16	MR. LEWIS: It ain't about rumors right now. It's
17	about facts.
18	MR. TRIMMER: Once again, he had every opportunity to
19	invite somebody or request them and he didn't.
20	MR. LEWIS: We brought everybody you asked for. We
21	brought JoJo. We still don't even know why he's here.
22	He doesn't know why he's here.
23	MR. DUARTE: Does he have any witnesses?
24	MR. LEWIS: Do you have any other witnesses?
25	MR. SEIXAS: That you wish to call.

1	MR. LEWIS: For the record, Brother JoJo Cortez, do
2	you have any idea why you're here?
3	MR. CORTEZ: No.
4	MR. LEWIS: Thank you, for the record.
5	What's next?
6	MR. SEIXAS: Do you rest your Eric, do you rest at
7	this point? Are you done?
8	MR. LEWIS: Eric, can we get an answer?
9	MR. SEIXAS: There's no answer.
10	MR. LEWIS: We've got a court reporter. She's got to
11	hear you say it.
12	MR. SEIXAS: Okay. He's not answering.
13	Brother Toledo, is there anything you'd like to
14	add?
15	MR. LEWIS: Let the record reflect he refuses to
16	answer.
17	MR. TOLEDO: I'm going to go sit right next to the
18	court reporter so I can get it documented exactly what
19	I'm going to say.
20	MR. LEWIS: Please do.
21	MR. TRIMMER: At least somebody will talk.
22	MR. LEWIS: Let the record show that Brother Aldape
23	is walking out of the room.
24	(Whereupon Mr. Aldape exited the proceedings)
25	MR. DUARTE: At 4:20 p.m.

MR. LEWIS: All right. Stop for a minute. Stop for 1 a minute. I'm going to request that we stop the trial 2 for right now, have a recess so we can discuss what our 3 options are right now because he walked out of this. 4 5 (Recess) MR. LEWIS: Let's put this back on the record. 6 Brother JoJo Cortez and Bobby Olvera are being 7 released as witnesses because the Trial Committee really 8 needs to be in session. 9 MR. OLVERA: So I'm excused; right? I'm leaving, 10 Brother Chair. 11 (Whereupon Mr. Aldape reentered the 12 13 proceedings) MR. LEWIS: We'll go back on the record. The Trial 14 Committee is back in session. The witnesses have been 15 16 excused. Brother Aldape is in presence right now and we are going to listen to David. 17 MR. TOLEDO: My name is Lawrence Toledo --18 MR. LEWIS: Oh, Lawrence. 19 MR. TOLEDO: -- 37920. I'm the one that filed this charge against Brother Eric Aldape. 21 To respond to Eric Aldape's e-mail about double 22 jeopardy, that grievance that I had filed was a grievance 2.3 24 matter. It was -- it had to relate to a violation of 25 grievance procedures that Eric Aldape had done.

(Whereupon Mr. Aldape exited the proceedings)

MR. TOLEDO: It had nothing to do with the Trial

Committee that is in process right now. I dropped that

complaint to protect the Union under the advice of the

president because -- to save the Union in legal fees that

would have transpired from that grievance complaint.

(Whereupon Mr. Aldape reentered the proceedings)

MR. TOLEDO: But that grievance complaint was nothing
to do with anything about the Trial Committee. It had to
do with Eric Aldape leaking out Grievance Committee

complaints and member information without the Grievance

Committee's knowledge, and that's what that was about.

This is a total separate issue. Usually, like with all matters that come with the Grievance Committee or even a Trial Committee, each matter is a separate issue and is dealt with separately on its own merits like a criminal court proceeding.

When it comes to Eric Aldape's conduct, I provided the Trial Committee with a full disclosure of everything that was important that needed to be addressed, not according to what Eric Aldape said, that it was a stupid complaint in his e-mail.

Everything that I have come up with is based off of labor law, the LMRDA, and our Constitutional bylaws, and I leave it up to the Trial Committee to look at the

line? Was -- when the letter you talked about was put 1 out, was he serving on caucus? Was he in San Francisco? 2 Was he on caucus? Was this after? Do you have a time line on that? 4 MR. TOLEDO: Do you guys have the copies that I have 5 in the complaint? 6 (Interruption in the proceedings) MR. LEWIS: Excuse me, guys. We're being requested 8 somewhere else. Trial is on hold for a minute. We're 9 taking a five-minute break, five minutes. 10 11 (Recess) MR. LEWIS: All right. Trial Committee will be 12 brought back into session. 13 MR. SEIXAS: As we come back into session, I want to 14 make a motion that Eric -- that his request for 15 transcripts be made official and that this committee send 16 a request for transcripts to the Coast, that he receives 17 that as soon as it's made available. Can I get a second? 18 MR. LOWE: Second. 19 MS. ZAKS: Second. MR. LEWIS: All those in favor say "aye." 21 (The motion was passed) MR. LEWIS: So we've -- Trial Committee has heard 23 from Brother Aldape and from Brother Lawrence. I don't 24 25 know where we go from here.

MR. SEIXAS: Go to closing arguments. 1 MR. LEWIS: All right. Closing arguments on both 2 3 sides. MR. TOLEDO: I'll go second. He can go first. 4 MR. LEWIS: Brother Aldape? 5 MR. ALDAPE: I came here today -- well, let's -- I 6 need a little clarification here. 7 MR. LEWIS: Yes, sir. 8 MR. ALDAPE: You guys said you're going to get the 9 transcripts. Are we going to hold the trial, the 10 11 hearing, off until we get the transcripts? MR. LEWIS: I don't believe so, Brother Eric. I 12 think we're -- you can put in a request. We're going to 13 put in a request for -- Brother Bobby, is it possible to 14 put in a request for the trial transcripts -- or for the 15 16 caucus transcripts? MR. OLVERA: As I had spoke previously, for reasons 17 other than anything that's going on here today, I've 18 requested transcripts from the caucus. I was told that 19 they're not available to date. So yes, you guys can request whatever. Whether you request it directly from 21 the Trial Committee to the Coast Committee or whether you 23 request it through the officers to the Coast Committee, I 24 don't see a problem with that.

But again, I caution this committee and both the

25

plaintiff and the defendant that knowing that something 1 is not available and requesting it as a basis to adjudicate a complaint is tantamount to filibustering and 3 intentional delay. There is a process for Trial 4 Committee decisions to be appealed to the membership and 5 even after that to the International presiding officer. 6 He is privy to those transcripts and any appeal that Mr. Aldape may or may not put forth, he understands that 8 process. He's flown to San Francisco, I think, or 9 Vancouver or somewhere to appear before the International 10 Executive Board to deal with an appeal. So he's fully 11 aware of his rights. But, again, yes, you may. 12 13 MR. LEWIS: Okay. MR. OLVERA: I cannot tell you when those transcripts 14 would be made available because they are not under my 15 control nor this Local's control. 16 MR. TRIMMER: On the question of the transcripts, he 17 requested transcripts on the afternoon of -- could we 18 have a specific date? 19 MR. ALDAPE: I don't have the paperwork in front of I sent it to Paula. I sent it from here. 21 MR. TRIMMER: So Paula has the specific date? MR. ALDAPE: Yes. Yes. 23 MR. LEWIS: Okay. Okay. 24

MS. ZAKS: I'm curious, what are the transcripts

going to do for you here?

MR. ALDAPE: The transcripts are going to say exactly what Big Bob said. It wasn't that he was going to get \$7 an hour. He never said that on the record. Okay? And that's what this is about.

MR. LEWIS: Okay.

MR. ALDAPE: She asked a question.

MR. LEWIS: All right. Just so you know, this is what I think this Trial Committee is about. Okay?

The charges are conduct unbecoming a Union brother. I don't think it's got a goddamn thing to do about how much money we actually got. I think it has to do with the fact that you broke ranks. That's what this Trial Committee is about. You broke ranks. You decided upon yourself that it was okay to spit out some information that was specifically requested not to be put out. That's what the Trial Committee is for. I don't know why we need all this other stuff, but okay. We'll get what you want. But as far as the transcripts are concerned, this Trial Committee will go on with the trial without the transcripts because you can take that up in appeals.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ TRIMMER: You said we will get what he wants. I'd like to clarify. We will request.

MR. LEWIS: Well, we are requesting what you would

2.3

like. But people down here who are in a higher position than I am or any other Union member have required -- have requested those transcripts and they still have not received them.

Requesting that you have a specific amount of gas for a car to keep going and you don't get it doesn't mean you stop. All right? I'm sorry. You can take it up with the Appeal Board. I mean, this is a democratic, you know --

MR. ALDAPE: Let me get this straight. This committee just made a motion and the motion was accepted by this committee to give me the transcripts and I wrote in there that I can't put on my case without the transcripts.

MS. ZAKS: Request.

MR. LEWIS: One of the committee members asked you what you needed the transcripts for. You said it specifically -- the words that came out of your mouth -- had to do with the \$7 an hour. That's not what this charge is about. It's not about that we lost money. The charge is that you gave out information that was not supposed to get out --

MR. ALDAPE: In the transcripts --

MR. LEWIS: -- because you were a paid officer at that caucus. You broke ranks. And then so much as --

MR. ALDAPE: Brother Chair --1 MR. LEWIS: As far as -- can I finish? As far as the 2 evidence was concerned and I'll -- actually, being a 3 witness at that particular time, you said, Yeah, I 4 fuckin' did it. 5 MR. ALDAPE: Brother Chair, I would remind you of a 6 motion that was just passed by this committee for the 7 transcripts. It was something that I requested and this 8 committee just agreed with me. They made the motion. I 9 didn't make the motion. Somebody on the committee did. 10 I asked for the transcripts for my case. 11 MS. ZAKS: Can I put a motion --12 MR. ALDAPE: No, you can't. I've got the floor. 13 MR. LEWIS: You have the floor. 14 MR. ALDAPE: I asked for transcripts. 15 MR. LEWIS: And it's been put in to our president 16 who's sitting just to your left. 17 MR. ALDAPE: All right. 18 MR. LEWIS: So you're getting your transcripts as 19 soon as we can possibly get them --MR. ALDAPE: I -- there was a motion on the floor. MR. LEWIS: -- but this --MR. ALDAPE: There was a motion on the floor to 23 provide this brother with the transcripts he asked for. 24 MR. LEWIS: We heard it. How many times are you

going to say it? 1 MR. ALDAPE: Okay? I'm not going to go on until I get my transcripts. 3 MR. LEWIS: You don't have to, but we can. 4 MR. ALDAPE: All right. Go ahead. Do what you gotta do then. 6 MS. ZAKS: All right. So it's my understanding --MR. LEWIS: We're going to go ahead. MR. SEIXAS: Eric, for the record, the motion was 9 made to get you the transcripts that aren't available, 10 but there was no motion made to discontinue the 11 proceedings of this trial. 12 MR. ALDAPE: Correct. 13 MS. ZAKS: Right. 14 MR. ALDAPE: Correct. There was no motion made to 15 discontinue the case. That's what I asked for and now 16 you just granted me what I asked for. 17 MR. SEIXAS: No, I didn't. 18 19 MR. ALDAPE: Correct? MR. SEIXAS: No. We granted you --20 MR. LEWIS: We asked you --21 MR. SEIXAS: -- a motion to get the minutes. MR. LEWIS: We asked our president to get a copy, for 23 24 us, not for you, for us. MR. SEIXAS: And we --

MR. LEWIS: So as far as that goes, this Trial 1 Committee will continue on with this Trial Committee. If 2 you have new evidence that comes up later, that's what 3 the appeal process is for. Okay? 4 5 Anybody else? MR. ALDAPE: I'm still on closing statements; right? 6 MR. LEWIS: I didn't realize you were. 7 8 MR. ALDAPE: Yeah. MR. LEWIS: Oh, I thought you had stopped. Okay. 9 Brother Aldape, you can finish your closing statements 10 11 right now. MR. ALDAPE: Conduct unbecoming a Union member. 12 Dang, Brother Chair, he's already got his mind made up. 13 14 MR. LEWIS: No, I don't. MR. ALDAPE: You're interrupting me and I've got the 15 16 floor, bro. MR. LEWIS: I'm sorry. I apologize. 17 MR. ALDAPE: You don't have to apologize. I've got 18 the floor. When it's your turn to talk, I won't 19 20 interrupt you. MR. LEWIS: Go for it. MR. ALDAPE: Brother Chair has already made up his 22 mind. We know that. What did he say? We're gonna go 23 on. Oh, wait a minute. Brother Chair said, "You dropped 24

the ball. You gave up what you weren't supposed to give

up." It sounds to me like he already made up his mind.

We all know about Seixas. Seixas says, "Oh, no. I'm not biased. I'm a good guy. I did this for the right thing to do." Right. That's why you tried to help Bobby Olvera in the complaint against me to find me guilty in a grievance; right? You came in there and lied, said I was tearing down flyers. The Committee found you to be a liar, bro, because they found me not guilty. And you want to come in here and say you're not biased. "No, I'm not biased. Oh, heck no, I'm not biased." Right.

And all this other stuff you read into the record about this and this rule here and this rule there, Brother Bobby said it right. He didn't tell you about the special caucus we had up in the -- up in the -- we had a room there, a suite. He didn't tell you about the special caucus. He didn't tell you where he said, "Brother Eric, this is your Jesus moment, bro. It's time for you to come clean." He didn't tell you that.

He didn't tell you what JoJo said. Yeah, I was at the caucus. For three hours they ripped on me about this letter and I sat there and I took everything, everything they had to throw at me. You think this is light? This is nothing compared to what they said.

Toledo was there. He knows what they said for three

hours. I'll say it on the record. They ripped me a new asshole, wanted to know when I was going to speak. "When are you going to take the chair, Eric?"

I've never been so scared in my life. We took lunch and Bobby's right. It was a Jesus moment, and after lunch, well, it was up in that room. Nobody knew what I was going to do and it was all 13 delegates. They were on me, worse than the guys for the last three hours from other Unions. Just like Bobby said, "We handle our own." They did.

They straightened me up. They didn't know it, but they did. And after lunch -- I want to put Ray -- I want to put -- I want to put Ray on the record, the records clerk. I called him up. I said, "I'm coming home, Ray." He said, "No, you're not." He said, "You stay there. You take what they gave to you and you're not going nowhere." "Fuck you, Ray. I'm going home. I'm not going back down there." Ray said, "You're staying there, Eric."

I went down. Bobby made the announcement. I took the censure for my letter and everything else that was going on in there and everything else that everybody said. They called me names I don't even want to say in here. It's not for this record. But I took it.

When I got up to that mic -- and Bobby's right.

Bobby's been my friend for years. We don't talk anymore. He never heard me apologize. He did that day. He saw me bring my heart on my sleeve, take the mic at the caucus for the same stuff that's going on here today, the same rhetoric, the same accusations, the same crap, "You did us wrong." All the crap I had to hear today, I heard for three hours. And when I took that mic, I only talked for one minute, one minute.

In that one minute, I said I was sorry for what I did, for what I wrote. I told the highest committee in the land, higher than anybody else it's an honor for me to be on there. Remember, I got elected when I was doing time off. I wasn't even allowed to be a member of this Union. I wasn't even allowed to go into the Hall and the membership put me in as a delegate. I took it very seriously.

I wrote the letter because some brothers asked me to write the letter because they knew what wanted in the crane negotiations. PMA put it on there. They put it on the news, this is their third and final offer at \$5.50. You didn't have to be no scientist or secret person. They put it in the news. They put it in a press release.

"Eric, you're a delegate. Can you help us out?"

"You know what, bro? I'll write a letter." And I did.

But that letter and everything that came with that letter, when I stood up at that mic, the highest court in the land, I took the censure. I was forgiven from that committee for that letter and everything else that came with it. As a matter of fact, Bobby forgot to mention I got a standing ovation from 90 percent of the people in there, and I think even Bobby stood up. I'm not sure. Maybe he didn't. But I tell you what. Big Bob shook my hand. The same man that ripped me a new asshole for three hours shook my hand as I walked back. So did Ray Fameletti. So did a couple of the other International officers.

There's double jeopardy. It is double jeopardy. The Constitution is clear, but we're going to live by the president's clarification. But there's no case that's been made here. This case was about \$0.50. I read the complaint. Did they bring any caucus delegate in here to say that, "Hey, we were going to get 7 bucks until Mr. Aldape"? Did they bring in a negotiator in here?

No. They had access to call the other caucus delegates. Oh, they said they were going to get \$7, but did they bring them in here to put it on the record? They didn't put it on the record. Seixas just put it on the record, the biased one. Oh, wait a minute. He says he's not biased. He says he ain't biased. My mistake.

So once again, I say the brother hasn't proved his case. What did he prove? How many times are we going to come at me for this? Oh, wait a minute. We're going to play tit for tat. That one didn't have a "T" in it, so we're going to put a "T" in that line. So we're going to bring him up over here even though he already got jammed up over there.

Put yourself in my shoes. I got jammed up once already for the same stuff. Yeah, I wasn't very nice today, but you wouldn't be neither if you had to sit there for three hours and listen to what I had to listen to. But once again, like Bobby said, I was forgiven, for that letter and everything that came with that letter, 'cause it wasn't just about the letter. It was about the Internet and everything else, the same stuff I had to hear today.

Now, if there was a problem, it would have been a problem or I should have been held to a bigger standard. I think that committee would have jammed me up, but they didn't. They forgave me because I did the right thing when it was my Jesus moment. I didn't lie. I went with my heart on my sleeve. That's why people stood up and clapped for me, because I said I was wrong. I accepted what I did was wrong. That's why the caucus stood up and gave me a standing ovation. That's why it

was never brought up anymore other than, "Eric, thanks for doing that, Eric." "Hey, Eric, thanks," from other caucus delegates. "Hey, Eric, we really appreciate what you did." "Thank you, Eric." "I'm glad you came clean, Eric." I heard that for the rest of the caucus.

Once again, this is double jeopardy. I've already paid for this. And even if it isn't double jeopardy, what is this guy (indicating) doing? What have they proved? Like I said, they had access to the rest of the caucus delegates. What did they hear, the delegates? I know what I heard and it wasn't that Big Bob came in there and said, "I was going to get \$7 if it wasn't for Eric." No. It was quite the opposite. Big Bob said, "The offer was \$5.50. He offered 7."

(Whereupon Mr. Duarte exited the proceedings)
MR. ALDAPE: McKenna said, "Your boys will take
\$5.50." Big Bob said, "I'll go all the way to
Washington, D.C." I don't know if you guys know there
was a time when they was almost going to go to

They are upset because despite their efforts to keep everything a secret, I am able to find out what they are doing in San Francisco.

"Bobby O. invites news cameras into our hall to complain about negotiations and gets his buddy, Local 23 President Dean McGrath, to do the same, then complains about my talking to Local 13 members in Ray's office. Get real.



b. No longshoreman shall be subject to double jeopardy with the respect to any alleged violation of any provision of any of the above Agreements. To this end, except as otherwise provided to the contrary in the applicable Agreement, no complaint against any longshoreman shall be initiated, or, if already initiated shall be dismissed, if another proceeding or proceedings with respect to such alleged violation have been commenced or adjudicated by the Committee or by any other committee of the Union or by any person, Labor Relations Committee (hereinafter LRC), Arbitrator, or other agency under the Grievance procedure provided in the applicable Agreement (Courts of Law excepted).

- c. Inasmuch as legislation and decision of the NLRB (National Labor Relations Board) and the courts have severely limited the disciplinary power of the Union and have imposed upon each and every Union the duty of fairly representing all persons within its bargaining unit, whether members or not, and inasmuch as these laws and decisions have subjected unions to severe penalties, neither the Grievance Committee nor any member, official or representative of the Union shall commit any act or omit to perform any act in violation of such laws or decisions.
- d. The Grievance Committee shall consist of ten (10) members in good standing, and, where the Accused so requests (after having been informed of his right to do so), five (5) additional longshoremen shall be selected to serve on such

Before I start my defense I demand a clarification from the President on the question of double jeopardy as defined by our Constitution and how it applies to this charge related to a "letter" that was read by Big Bob at the Caucus, and for which I accepted censure at the Caucus.

Depending on the President's answer, in writing or transcribed by the court reporter, I will need the following documents before I proceed.

- A copy of the transcript for the afternoon session of the Caucus where my letter was discussed and my censure was made part of the record.
- A copy of the list of the members who signed up for the Trial Committee at the 1st Union meeting where it was announced.
- A copy of the list of the members who signed up for the Trial Committee at the 3rd Union meeting where it was announced.

The second matter that I request a clarification on is whether or not this is a valid trial committee because according to the Constitution, the charge "shall" be read at a membership meeting and a trial committee picked at that membership meeting.

In this case the charge was never read, the Secretary/Treasurer just announced that there was a trial committee against me, and members were asked to sign up, but not enough signed up to go ahead with the trial.

At the next Union meeting, there was not a quorum so members were not asked to sign up, but that did not stop Bobby from talking shit about me including accusing me of screwing up the Child of Deceased rule because I am helping Rapid Fire's daughter.

At the third Union meeting members were asked again to sign up for the trial committee, without the charges being read as required by the Constitution.

I will need a written clarification from the President as to whether or not this is a valid Trial Committee charge, as the charge was never read to the membership as required by the Constitution and the Committee was not picked in accordance with the Constitution.

The third matter that needs clarification from the President is whether or not I have the right to be provided the transcript from the Caucus meeting where he announced that I had accepted censure, and Big Bob explained how he used my letter to get another \$1 per hour.

Before going forward, I will need the clarifications I have requested in writing or transcribed by the court reporter.
